The City of Eugene is working to build a culture of preparedness

Increasing our overall disaster resilience is the responsibility of every community member. By providing tools and resources to our community members, the City of Eugene is working toward one goal—overall disaster preparedness. Disasters are major events which can strike anywhere and at any time. *In a disaster, traditional 911 and first responder capabilities such as fire, police, medics, and utility personnel will be overwhelmed* and unable to immediately assist individuals.

Get to Know Your Neighbors



Preparing your neighborhood is vital. Neighbors will likely be the first ones to help each other. Prepared neighbors are more effective in their response to a disaster and have an increased capacity to be self-sufficient for the first 72 hours after a disaster.

Knowing your neighbors can give you a critical advantage during an emergency. Good community relationships can help keep your family and neighborhood safe and simplify your family communication plan. By taking these simple steps, you and your neighbors can be better prepared:

- ☐ Make arrangements with your neighbors to check on each other's homes and pets.
- ☐ Find out what specialized skills, knowledge, equipment your neighbors possess.

Knowing what is available to you in the event of a disaster can make your response more effective. The **Map Your Neighborhood** toolkit, developed by Dr. LuAn K. Johnson, PhD, Washington State Emergency Management Division, is a great tool to help in your neighborhood. Information To Help You & Your Neighbors

CERT Program

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may occur where they live. The CERT program offers a consistent, nationwide approach to volunteer training and organization that professional responders can rely on during disaster situations, allowing them to focus on more complex tasks. CERT trains volunteers in basic disaster response skills, such as: *fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations.*

The City and CERT have developed a Neighborhood Radio Communications Response Guide to support neighbors to communicate needs after an incident to the City Emergency Operations Center. Consider becoming active with the Eugene—Springfield CERT. Visit https://eugene-cert.com/ for more information.

Make A Plan

Everyone should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive several days if an emergency occurs. It is important that individuals have created a list of items they need to have on hand that considers the unique needs of their family, including pets. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time. Sign UP for Lane Alerts

Lane Alerts allows people to receive notifications via phone call, text message and email based on locations they care about. At minimum, people signing up must provide their name and one method of contact. Residents can choose to receive notifications about emergency events that may affect their home, their workplace, their child's school, etc.

Lane Alerts will be used to notify people about imminent threats to their safety, as well as informational notifications that affect locations they choose to include in their profile. The emergencies that people may receive alerts about include evacuations, severe weather, flooding, police activity, and more. A SHiNA neighbor noticed that the fire hydrant at 2390 McClean had been knocked over. She got in touch with the SHiNA Board asking who would be responsible for fixing the problem and making sure there was a fire hydrant in working order. The Fire Department removed it. This type of problem should be reported to David Wiltermood in Public Works. When it was, the fire hydrant was quickly replaced by a new one. In this incident we also learned that fire hydrants when knocked over do not send out an "Old Faithful style" fountain of water, like in the movies! *Thank you Beth!*
